Samui Rescue Jaws of Life training

Following our purchase of the 'Jaws of Life' machine for Samui Rescue our final commitment was to ensure adequate training was carried out for the volunteers who would be using the equipment in cases of emergency.

Sister organisation Satar Rescue from Suratthani brought six of their own staff across to Samui to train over 50 staff based at the seven stations around Samui.

The training was carried out at Samui Rescue's primary base in Nathon where the staff were divide in to teams of six.

An initial lecture was given by Khun Un followed by instruction as to how the equipment should be assembled prior to use.



Teams were then shown how to use the various components of jaws, cutters and hydraulic lifting gear utilising a wrecked taxi for practice.













Sarnelli House Orphanage

Over the past seven years one of our major annual projects has always been to bring some orphaned children here to Koh Samui for a holiday from the Mercy Centre in Bangkok.

Towards the end of last year, I became aware of a similar project carried out last October by Christoph Leonhard the General Manager of Amari Palm Reef Resort here in Chaweng.

Sarnelli House Orphanage near Nongkai in Northern Issan is home to children of all ages, many being HIV positive through no fault of their own and run by Father Michael Shea.

Unlike our own club with many of our members and friends helping to raise funds to cover the cost of the holidays and indeed get involved in the weekend itself, last October, Christoph took it upon himself to bring 12 children on the long journey from Nongkai to the holiday island of Samui.



The trip was an unqualified success with Christoph promising to organise a similar holiday at a later date.

Last month, during Thailand's long two

month school holiday period, Christoph once again brought twelve orphans here to Samui from Sarnelli House for a full weeks holiday.

As we in the Rotary Club have empathy with his endeavours we decided the least we could do was to help fill the week long holiday by organising something for the kids ourselves.

Rotarian Paul Hawkins and his wife Sim the owners of Scoops American style Ice Cream parlour in Lamai were approached



to ask if they could help.

Paul immediately agreed to invite the kids to his shop and gave them the ice creams of their choice.

For entertainment,

we invited the local 'balloon' man who kept the kids entertained producing animals and other objects using only long cylindrical balloons.

Although tired when they arrived, following their earlier trip to Namuang Safari Park, they soon perked up quaffing



copious amounts of ice cream and playing with the balloons.

Thanks also to Lorraine Clark of Women's Business Network who

provided all the kids with 'goodie bags'

The club gave all the kids T-shirts and baseball caps as a reminder of their stay.

Many thanks to Christoph for allowing us to



play a small part in entertaining these wonderful kids during their stay and will again offer him support the next time some of these amazing kids arrive for their holiday of a lifetime here on Samui.





It happened this month

June 3, 1937 - The Duke of Windsor married Wallis Warfield Simpson in Monts, France. As King Edward VIII, he had abdicated the British Throne in December of 1936 amid tremendous controversy to marry Simpson, an American who had been divorced. Following the wedding, the couple lived in France and had minimal contact with the British Royal family. The Duke died in Paris on May 28, 1972, and was buried near Windsor Castle in England.

June 5, 1968 - Robert F. Kennedy was shot and mortally wounded while leaving the Hotel Ambassador in Los Angeles. The shooting occurred after a celebration of Kennedy's victory in the California presidential primary. He died at 1:44 a.m., June 6, at age 42, leaving behind his wife Ethel and eleven children, the last one born after his death.

June 6, 1944 - D-Day, the largest amphibious landing in history, began in the early-morning hours as Allied forces landed in Normandy on the northern coast of France. Operation Overlord took months of planning and involved 1,527,000 soldiers in 47 Allied divisions along with 4,400 ships and landing craft, and 11,000 aircraft. The Germans had about 60 divisions spread along France and the Low Countries. American forces landed on two western beaches, Utah and Omaha, while British and Canadian troops landed farther east on Gold, Juno and Sword beaches. By the end of the day 150,000 Allied soldiers and their accompanying vehicles had landed with 15,000 killed and wounded.

June 9, 1898 - The British signed a 99-year lease for Hong Kong, located on the south eastern coast of China. Hong Kong, consisting of an area measuring 400 square miles, was administered as a British Crown Colony until July 1, 1997, when its sovereignty reverted to the People's Republic of China.

June 11, 1994 - After 49 years, the Soviet military occupation of East Germany ended. At one time there had been 337,800 Soviet troops stationed in Germany. Over 300,000 Russians died during World War II in the Battle for Berlin.

June 16, 1963 - Valentina Tereshkova, 26, became the first woman in space as her Soviet spacecraft, Vostok 6, took off from the Tyuratam launch site. She manually controlled the spacecraft completing 48 orbits in 71 hours before landing safely.

June 17, 1972 - Following a seemingly routine burglary, five men were arrested at the National Democratic Headquarters in the Watergate complex in Washington, D.C. However, subsequent investigations revealed the burglars were actually agents hired by the Committee for the Re-election of President Richard Nixon. A long chain of events then followed in which the president and top aides became involved in an extensive cover-up of this and other White House sanctioned illegal activities, eventually leading to the resignation of Richard Nixon on August 9, 1974.

June 18, 1815 - On the fields near Waterloo in central Belgium, 72,000 French troops, led by Napoleon, suffered a crushing military defeat from a combined Allied army of 113,000 British, Dutch, Belgian, and Prussian troops. Thus ended 23 years of warfare between France and the other powers of Europe. Napoleon was then sent into exile on the island of St. Helena off the coast of Africa. On May 5, 1821, the former vain-glorious Emperor died alone on the tiny island, abandoned by everyone.

June 25, 1950 - The Korean War began as North Korean troops, led by Russian-built tanks, crossed the 38th parallel and launched a full scale invasion of South Korea. Five days later, U.S. ground forces entered the conflict, which lasted until July 27, 1953, when an armistice was signed at Panmunjom, formally dividing the country at the 38th parallel into North and South

June 28, 1919 - The signing of the Treaty of Versailles formally ended World War I. According to the terms, Germany was assessed sole blame for the war, forced give up Alsace-Lorraine and overseas colonies, and pay reparations of \$15 Billion. The treaty also prohibited German rearmament.

June 30, 1997 - In Hong Kong, the flag of the British Crown Colony was officially lowered at midnight and replaced by a new flag representing China's sovereignty and the official transfer of power.

The Rotary Challenge to **END** Polio

Since 1988, Rotary International and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) — the World Health Organization, UNICEF, and the U.S. Centres for Disease Control and Prevention — have worked to wipe polio from the face of the earth. A volunteer service organization of 1.2 million men and women, Rotary began immunizing children against polio in 1985 and became a spearheading partner in the GPEI three years later.



Rotary's main responsibilities are fundraising, advocacy, and volunteer recruitment. To date, Rotary has contributed more than US\$900 million to the polio eradication effort.

With over 33,000 clubs in more than 200 countries and geographical areas, Rotary is able to reach out to national governments worldwide to generate crucial financial and technical support for polio eradication. Since 1995, the advocacy efforts of Rotary and its partners have helped raise more than \$8 billion from donor governments.

Rotary clubs also provide "sweat equity" on the ground in polio-affected communities, which helps ensure that leaders at all levels remain focused on the eradication goal. Rotary club members have volunteered their time and personal resources to reach more than two billion children in 122 countries with the oral polio vaccine.

Thanks to Rotary and its partners, the world has seen polio cases plummet by more than 99 per cent, preventing five million instances of child paralysis and 250,000 deaths. When Rotary began its eradication work, polio infected more than 350,000 children annually. In 2009, fewer than 1,700 cases were reported worldwide.

But the polio cases represented by that final 1 per cent are the most difficult and expensive to prevent. Challenges include geographic isolation, worker fatigue, armed conflict, and cultural barriers.

That's why it's so important to generate the funding needed to End Polio Now. To fail is to invite a polio resurgence that would condemn millions of children to lifelong paralysis in the years ahead.



The bottom line is this: As long as polio threatens even one child anywhere in the world, all children — wherever they live — remain at risk.

Rotary International

Rotary International is the world's first service club organization, with more than 1.2 million members in 33,000 clubs worldwide.

Rotary club members are volunteers who work locally, regionally, and internationally to combat hunger, improve health and sanitation, provide education and job training, promote peace, and eradicate polio under the motto:

"Service Above Self"
